# CHAIRMAN'S LETTER (Mrs Pauline Earley)

HELLO EVERYONE, hope you are all well (that includes our feline friends of course). It has been a very busy time for the Committee since April, with new Club Rules needing to be written. As you know they were approved at the EGM then went up to the GCCF Executive for approval and they were returned needing a few changes which were again approved by the members at the last EGM. The result is a super early Christmas present for the Club - Affiliation with the GCCF has been approved.

As you will know by now the October Breed Seminar has had to be cancelled due to lack of support, these events do need to pay for themselves. The January Seminar will now cater for all colours, this is a great shame as it would have been so helpful to have had room for both types of variant as well as the Tonkinese coat patterns in all the colours - and there seems to be such a variation of colours being bred. A TBC Stud Register should be in operation shortly, this is something

which I am sure you will agree we are in need of!
I wish you and your cats well and hope that any of you attending the Supreme and National shows really enjoy your day/s.

### SEC's NOTES (Mrs Linda Vousden)

From the time of the their election at the AGM in April this Committee has had to work exceptionally hard to prepare the correct paperwork, accounts and Club rules to meet the requirements of the GCCF. The Club accounts have had to be prepared in the approved format and re-audited (by the Club's approved auditor Mrs J Plested); and as you know there had to be a completely new set of rules drawn up by an appointed sub-Committee, these were then discussed in a mammoth 10 hour Committee meeting before submitting them to the Club for approval. After communication with the GCCF Executive and support from Mrs Lesley Pring (the GCCF Hon. Secretary) our application was finally granted at GCCF Council meeting on October 26th!

Thank s to all who were able to come to the EGM on September 25th. The meeting actually lasted only 20 minutes but could have held the Club back a whole year if it had not been successful! The amendments to the Club Rules are enclosed with this issue, will you please mark-up your copy of the Rules to reflect these amendments and re-date your Rules as 25th September 1994.

Having had to call two additional general meetings of the Club, plus the cost of affiliation fees and paperwork, it has been quite an expensive time for the Club. Sadly we have had very little response to our appeals for fund-raising ideas so please have a think about this, in the meantime thank-you to those of you who have generously made donations to Club or Welfare funds.

Thanks malnly to the efforts of Helen Barnes and John Siewruk we have had a Club stand at a number of cat shows - if you're ever passing one do stop and have a look, buy if you like and even lend a hand for half an hour or so. Look out for Club advertisements in the November issue of Cat World and the National show catalogue. Look out for the Club ad. feature in the December issue of Cat World and in April we will have a rather exciting splash of publicity - but you have to wait until the next issue for details!!!

I have had appreciative feed-back from several members, especially those further afield than the south of England, about the extra info in the Committee Bulletins, I am also delighted to have heard from so many of you recently on all sorts of matters, however a few Tonkinese fallacies appear to be raising their heads and need clarification so:

"You can tell a Tonk from a variant because it has a stripe up it's back."

WRONG: The stripe seen on some Tonkinese (and Tonkinese variants) is a result of body heat distribution. A characteristic of the 'pointed' coat pattern is that the colour of the coat deepens in lower temperatures, the skin on the ears, face, paws, tail (and to a lesser degree along the spine) is a few degrees cooler than the body so here the fur is darker. Cats with more flesh along the spine are less likely to show the stripe than others, it is also more prevalent in some breeding lines than others. Kittens reared in a warm environment are commonly paler than those from a cooler environment; this difference may also be seen between kittens born in Summer and Winter.

"An adolescent cat's blue eyes could come back to blue/green as they take up to two years to fully develope."

NOT NECESSARILY TRUE: An adolescent cat whose eyes are blue, but with a

hint of another colour, may come back to blue/green as they do have some pigmentation. A cat whose eyes are pure blue, however pale, have no pigmentation and as such cannot revert to blue/green. A Tonkinese may take up to two years to fully develope - equally it may take less!

"The GCCF only check 3 generations on a registration form - so we have a 3 generation registration policy."

WRONG: The approved Tonkinese registration policy is 5 generations - ie. to be a Tonkinese the cat must have 5 generations behind it of only Siamese, Burmese or Tonkinese. Just because the GCCF only checks 3 generations (as with all cat registration forms) it does not mean that Tonkinese breeders shouldn't breed their Tonks according to the approved policy (this would be rather like saying that because our European partners don't have quarantine regulations we needn't bother sadly an out-of-date example now).

In March 1994 the GCCF granted retrospective registration to a few Tonkinese with less than 5 correct generations behind them - this was a one-off action to help confirm our registration policy for the future. We are working with the GCCF to clarify any 'grey areas' that might result from this action.

"If the cat has REF in its registration number it can't be a proper Tonk."

WRONG: There are number of good
reasons that a Tonkinese may be on
the REFerence register:-

1) It may have been born <u>before</u> the GCCF officially recognised the breed (1st May 1991), a Tonk born after that date is placed on the EXPerimental register unless:-

It may have an unregistered cat, but of correct breeding, in its pedigree.

 It may be a Tonkinese with a variant coat-pattern.

# THE TONKINESE BREED ADVISORY COMMITTEE (BAC)

The Club Committee are now setting-up the BAC. The BAC is <u>not</u> a sub-committee of this Club nor does it represent the Club - it represents the Tonkinese Breed and will deal with all matters specific to the breed eg. SOP, breed programme etc. The BAC will normally be made-up from representatives of all GCCF affiliated Tonkinese clubs - so until there is another such affiliated club it will made-up from the TBC in accordance with the GCCF Rules and our Club Rules.

If anyone has any points to make or changes to propose regarding the SOP they should put them in writing asap to the Club secretary Linda Vousden, to be passed on to the BAC committee in time for the first BAC meeting expected to take place in February 1995. We have already had some input regarding the SOP.

#### THE 'WORLD OF CATS'

The National Cat Club Show at Olympia on December 10th looks set to beat all records entertainment value. Besides the usual exhibits, trade stalls and food concessions there will also be an exhibition of Louis Wain's work (with some newly discovered items), more seating space for the weary and the BBC filming the Best in Show arena! In the gallery the 'World of Cats' will allow the public to get a really good look at the breeds (this should give the exhibitors some breathing space downstairs). There will be about 140 cats on exhibitions including 5 Tonks! We will have a little table space to advertise the Club - Breeders, if you would like to place your business card on our board send it to Linda Vousden with the correct fee of four 25p stamps. We will also have some of the Club photos on display - for more info. contact Linda Vousden or Carol Poole.

#### TBC STUD REGISTER

The Stud Register will be available for a small fee as soon as we have compliled the returned forms from stud owners.

The Committee are also in the process of producing a booklet listing Club members who are Tonkinese breeders. This will be on sale from our Club stand at cat shows etc. This will be a very useful booklet for anyone seeking Tonkinese breeders, whether they are Tonk lovers or breeders seeking to progress thier breed programs - and the free advertising doesn't hurt does it?

At his first show at the age of six months Corvin Angel was nominated for Best In Show - understandably I was pleased for the breed, to feel a Tonkinese was competing with other top cats in Holland. As a matter of interest I was also pleased with the way the purchase was conducted, after all of my own required standards and the official standards were met the owner came over to Ramsgate, which is just 35 minutes from us, and stayed overnight. On their return journey the kitten and owner travelled together with only an 8 hour journey ahead of them.

I must admit I was apprehensive when I first had an enquiry from Holland but being so close to the English Channel one forgets that the kitten is nearer to us than if sold "up North". Please correct me if I am wrong but I think he is the first Tonkinese to be sold to Holland as a stud Mrs Coral Macey, Folkestone cat!

Dear Linda,

I am sending you two pictures of my Tonkanese cat for the library and a photo-copy of her appearance as the first Tonkanese ever in the German-European Breeding Book.

At her first show she made an excellent 1st and Best in Show! To get into the Breeding Book, especially a Tonkanese in Germany, is quite a success as many people here still think that the Tonkanese is not a breed Manuela Martin, Düsseldorf by itself.

[ Many congratulations Manuela, you deserve to be proud of your lovely natural mink (brown) girl -Tajens Fastforward.]

Yes, I thought that might attract your attention, but it is true, I hold her completely responsible for my addiction to the cat fancy in general, and the Tonkinese breed in particular. My story begins with the sad end of my last (and most favourite) blue Burmese. She had been with me all through art college, boyfriends, the beginning (and end) of one marriage, the meeting of my new husband, his three sons and the birth of my daughter! I felt I could never replace her and would rather not try . However after a few months the children said the place felt empty and I had to agree with them. So when a copy of Cat World waved at me one day from a shelf in W H Smiths I took this as a 'sign' and took it home. The breeder of my original girl had ceased to breed, but I noticed an ad for a Tonkinese, Tonky What? I looked it up and found it was a Burmese /Siamese hybrid, interesting, I phoned the number. This is where the rot set in and I first spoke to Diana. After being thoroughly quizzed as to my circumstances, Diana told me that she did indeed have some kittens available, there were two left, and as I thought two would be a good idea, I agreed to visit Seaford with all haste, the only draw back was the fact that Diana thought that one of the kittens was Show Quality, and would really only sell her to someone who would show her. I didn't really know what Show Quality meant, and in my defence I can only say that I was also heavily pregnant with my second child and at that marvellously glowing stage when anything is possible so I found myself muttering something about Not Minding Having A Go If It Wasn't Too Complicated.

Of course when we saw the kittens it was love at first sight and I babbled my promise to show paid a deposit and waited the long few weeks until it was time to pick up the new babies. ## TRAVEL WITH OUR TONKINESE Janet Howden

24th June 1994. The great day had arrived and we collected "our boys" a big chocolate Siamese type whom we called Jacob and, and the smallest of the litter a little blue boy, Joseph. "Do you think they will travel?" I asked Pauline, remembering the last 20 years in which our much loved black moggy had so enjoyed journeys in the car. "I don't see why not" was the reply. The journey home, along the M27 in the rush hour was not a good start with their frantic scratching in the basket and obvious fear at leaving their familiar surroundings.

Within a month came the school holidays and we all agreed, at this very early stage in our relationship, our beautiful boys couldn't be packed off to an unknown cattery. The challenge was on!

Our essential purchase was a kitten pen which we erected in our caravan before hitching up. Then with our two children in the back of the car and both kittens in their travelling basket we headed north. It was a very short time before I turned round to see one kitten on each lap, curled up asleep. We had a couple of stops at motorway service stations, during which time we transferred the boys from car to pen in the van where they had access to their litter tray, food and water. By early evening we had reached the Caravan Club site in Kendal. We stayed there two nights and didn't put up the awning which meant the kittens squashed in with us at night. I had quite forgotten how nocturnal young cats can be. During the day they came with us in the car and enjoyed a picnic on a quiet hillside. While we were in Kendal we met two 14 year old Siamese sisters, who had travelled thousands of miles with their family in a camper van. They wished us much luck and happiness in our travels.

The following day we continued north, finally reaching North Ledaig, about 7 miles from Oban. A breathtaking site on the beach, overlooking the loch and the Isle of Mull. The boys were intrigued. Keeping a wary eye out for dogs, they walked happily on their leads and explored the beach - the sand was fascinating and a lovely place to dig. Here the boys discovered another source of amusement - the children's adventure playground. An exciting place to climb and play hide and seek. They were also fairly impressed with Rame head and the picnic we all had there.

It is now early September. The children are back at school, everyone has returned reluctantly to work but our boys play on. Joseph is quite computer literate and I often return from answering a telephone call to find him sitting on the computer with paws draped nonchalantly over the screen, which displays several lines of his keyboard skills. They are so intelligent, although they haven't quite mastered the complete English language yet, they are oriental and only 24 weeks old. But they are showing deep understanding of such classic phrases as "Noshies for boys" and "Rolypoly tickly tumble"... and by-the-way Pauline they DO travel - over 2000 miles by our reckoning.



RULE AMENDMENTS, APPROVED 25/9/94

RULE 2
a) Now to read :"To promote interest in the breeding and exhibiting of Tonkinese under Governing Council of the Cat Fancy (GCCF) Rules."

- c) Delete "Governing Council of the Cat Fancy" and delete brackets around "GCCF".
- d) Delete all after "to the Council"

RULE 3

- e) Delete the words "on a surety of £100 which may be returned at the discretion of the Committee"
- f) The phrase "must apply for reelection to the Club Committee" to read "must apply to the Club Committee for re-election".

RULE 5

a) Delete "family (Immediate)" and replace with "household".

RULE 7

- a) Delete the word "jointly".
- b) Delete the phrase "likely to prove injurious". Delete the full stop after "Club"

Delete the full stop after "Club" and append "; in accordance with Rule 3e) any such member has the right to appeal."

c) Delete all after "shall on request" and append "of the Committee, surrender them to the Committee."

d) Now to read :-

"If a matter comes before the Club Committee that is covered by Article 12 of the GCCF Constitution, it shall be passed immediately to the Secretary of the GCCF."

e) Now to read:"Complaints not covered by 7d) shall
be dealt with by the Committee at
their discretion and as
appropriate."

RULE 9

a) After "Honorary Secretary" replace the phrase "not less than 6 weeks before the date of the AGM

and" with "before the 28th of February, the agenda".

Replace the last sentence with "The Chairman must accept amendments to motions on the agenda and may at his/her discretion permit the discussion of other matters."

d) Replace the first sentence with "Every member, excepting Junior and Honorary members, present at the meeting shall have one vote on each proposal, motion and amendment."

RULE 10

- a) Replace the word "approved" with the word "elected".
- b) After "Committee members" insert ", Delegate/s and substitute Delegate".

After "received by the Secretary" replace the phrase "at least six weeks before the meeting." with "before the 28th of February."

Replace the last three sentences with :- "In the event of a tie there will be a re-vote between the two people concerned by the members present at the AGM. Ballot results will be announced at the AGM and all ballot forms will be retained for one calendar month after the announcement."

d) Delete all and rename RULE 10e) as 10d), RULE 10f) as 10e), RULE 10g) as 10f) and RULE 10h) as 10g).

RULE 11

b) Now to read :-"The Delegate/s, and substitute Delegate, shall be nominated only from members of the serving Committee and shall be elected in accordance with Rule 10b). Delegate/s re-elected to the Committee will be eligible for nomination the following year unless they fail to attend at least two thirds of the relevant meetings of the GCCF during thier term of office. Delegate/s not re-elected to serve on the Committee shall be co-opted as non-voting Committee member/s. Delegates will hold office during the immediate succeeding official year of the GCCF."
