

PEDIGREE ARCHIVES - Urgent Appeal to you all.

As you know, the Club is still trying to build up a pedigree archive but the number of pedigrees supplied by breeders for this very valuable and unique asset during the past 3 years has numbered less than 10! We KNOW that there have been more than 10 litters

of Tonkinese kittens bred in this period — please, please breeders (and owners if you haven't done so already) send in a copy of your pedigree/s so that we can get our archive up to date. The information we have has already been of use to several breeders trying to correct details on their pedigrees or trace missing links—and even helped one breeder regain part of their lost breeding line. Several owners have used it to fill in gaps in their pedigree backgrounds and on one occasion it has helped us to re-home a Tonkinese.

We know that some people have concerns about passing on registration numbers, if this is what's preventing you from contributing to the archives please feel free to omit the last 3 digits of your registration numbers (we do need to know the letters) —but let us try, as a Club, to have as comprehensive a record as we possibly can. Send a copy of your pedigree/s to the Hon.Secretary (address on page 2), ideally list the names of all kittens in the litter (with their colours and coatpatterns) on the pedigree.

—and thank you for taking the time to do this.

HON SEC REPORT

Hello Everyone! As usual at this time of year I am up to my eyes in preparations for our show and, as ever, I hope to see more of you this year than last. So many of you joined in with the theme last year that we decided to continue the fun. I hope that there isn't any Club member who is not aware of this year's theme – if so take a look at our web site (www.tonkinese.info).

I shan't take up too much of your magazine but there are a few worrying points that have been brought to my attention over the past few months that need some clarification:-

There is no such thing as Caramel? – This is not true - what is true is that caramel is not produced as a specific colour, like brown, blue or chocolate for instance. The caramel colour is actually a modification of the dilute colours - blue or lilac. Now here's the thing – our standard of points states that blue must be "Bluish-grey body colour, ...with darker slate-grey points" and lilac must be "Warm lilac body colour merging with darker lilac points"; but once these colours have been modified by the dilute modifier they become a significantly different colour from those described in the SOP. So how can we ask our judges to judge these toffee-coloured cats fairly as blue or lilac? The answer is that we can't, so the GCCF have sensibly recognised the difference and given these cats a colour of their own. You can't breed with variant coat-pattern Tonkinese? - This is not true! I shan't spend any more time on this except to say that if you are uncertain about this please read the registration policy again.

You must have a 3rd generation Tonkinese if you want to show or breed now? This is perhaps the most baffling rumour I've heard for some time. One or more Tonkinese breeders have said this to potential kittens owners. I hope its just a case that someone is merely confused about the registration policy and urge them to read it again and, if necessary, my own guide to understanding it (available from the club web site). Unfortunately I was also told that this has been mentioned in a recent cat book, I've not seen it but would be grateful if anyone else comes across it to let me know which book it is.

There is still so much nonsense printed in books about our Tonks that we certainly don't want to perpetuate the confusion ourselves!

Happy Tonking Everyone – Don't forget to come along and support your show however you can \dots Bracknell Leisure Centre, 30^{th} October \dots anticipating black cats, cauldrons, broomsticks and pointed hats.


My first Tonk Litter—Sue Amor

I had been patiently waiting throughout the whole of my half term holiday for Kizzie, Bonzer Kiss Inthedark, to produce her litter of kittens. I had moved into the kitten room over night and had set up my portable dvd player for when I got bored.

On Friday 4th June, Kizzie was really restless and I sensed that this was going to be the day. At approx 12.30 lunchtime out popped kitten number one, a blue boy. From then on, until 2.40 there was a veritable production line. Kizzie was coping really well until kitten number 5. The kitten had been born but she hadn't expelled the afterbirth when she became distressed. She didn't know whether to concentrate on the kitten that had just been born or the previous 4 squeaking nicely on the heated pad in the kitten pen. After a few minutes of panic from Kizzie I had to intervene and try to cut the cord with afterbirth still unborn. This was easier said than done. Kizzie would not stat still and when I did eventually manage the task we were left with a healthy kitten with a lovely hernia! It was at this point that I decided I wanted Kizzie to stop. 5 kittens were plenty as far as I was concerned! Kizzie, however, had other ideas. She very calmly produced 3 more kittens which meant a total of 8. I don't know who was more shell shocked—Kizzie or me! We had 3 girls and 5 boys, one blue tonk boy, 2 blue tabby girls, a blue tabby boy, 3 blue pointed boys and a blue pointed girl.

Kizzie proved to be an excellent mum and reared all 8 kittens beautifully. One of the blue pointed boys, nicnamed Tiny Tim, became a bit of a concern around weaning time but he soon caught up with the others once he discovered solid food. The kittens were an absolute delight and I was so thrilled that I had 2 tabby girls from which to choose my next breeding queen and potential show cat I had huge fun choosing their pedigree names. They all had my prefix Amorcatz but I had Minnie Coopurr, who I kept, Furrari, Pawche, Purrgeot, Alfurr Romeo, Kitsubishi, Meowcedes and Oowdi. The vet couldn't stop laughing when I took them in for their injections!

I couldn't believe how forward the kittens were. They were out of the kitten pen by 2 weeks old and had climbed to the top of their new cat scratcher by the time they were 3 1/2 weeks old. They loved mingling with my other cats after their first injections and I know that helped give them the confidence to take over the running of their new homes when they left. Roll on my next litter!!

What's in a name

There are probably as many ways of naming a cat as there are cats. How do you go about choosing names for yours? I try to leave it long enough for the kitten to exhibit its own name. That's quite difficult to do when you have people coming round to look at them and saying "We'll have that one" or better still We'll have those two. What are their names?" I feel a little strange trying to explain they haven't grown into any names yet.

Some grow into names very early. There was Blob and Cricket, and that reminds me of another name, Grimble. Back before I bred Tonkinese I had some lovely mog kittens, Grimble was Blob and Cricket's mum, I'll tell you about Grimble later. Blob was a dusty black kitten. He was a lazy little fellow, or so I thought at the time. He didn't get up on his back legs to start with, just walked on his front paws and pulled his back legs along behind. He looked like a lovely little black ink blob. He did get up on his back legs eventually. His brother, Cricket, was the opposite, always dashing about. He jumped sideways every time he got close to something and chirped as he did it. Hence Cricket.

Then there was Phantom. Phantom Michael bought from a pet shop, well it was a long time ago and people did those sort of things back then. Phantom was a really black kitten. When she walked up the garden at night there was just a pair of yellow eyes approaching you. You can guess it was easy to name her. Phantom was Grimble's sister. Grimble was a tortoiseshell, a real tortoiseshell. Not a speck of white, but black and ginger all over, no patches just a complete mix. The name Grimble came from an exforeman of mine. When he had something that was giving him trouble it was always 'giving him grimble'. Oh boy, and did she live up to her name! We thought that we ought to allow her to have one set of kittens, so after the first set she was booked to go to the vet. Who escaped on the way? Who got lost for four days and had us knocking on doors, putting up notices? Who, when she finally returned and was booked in to the vets a second time couldn't be spayed because she was pregnant again?

Dandelion was called that because she was a long haired cameo cat. She reminded me so of a dandelion puff ball. Jelly Bean was Dandelion's son. When he was a kitten he sat in his box looking up and quivered like a jelly.

Well now on to my Tonkinese names. First my Keroon prefix. Keroon is an area on Pern. Pern is planet discovered in Anne McCaffrey's dragon books. Pern is where the dragons live. Michael e-mailed Anne McCaffrey and she was very pleased that we had used the name from her books and wished us good luck with the breeding. The kittens all have a dragon name as a given name. Queen dragons are gold, so the girls tend to get queens' names. The boys mostly get bronze, brown or blue dragons' names because those colours are male dragons. Finally the kittens get either the name they 'grow' into, or sometimes the name their new owners request.


Button 'grew' into her name because she is my chocolate button. Frocious, who is shyest thing on four legs, originally 'grew' into his name because he had one toy that was HIS toy and he growled when anyone else so much as looked at it. We had Brumble, who at one stage almost became Bramble when he climbed all over the kitten pen, including hanging from the top to try and escape through the queen hatch. He had the loudest purr that I've ever heard so he became Brumble instead as a combination of bramble and rumble. Another kitten became Ivy, she too was a climber and hanger.

TONKINESE BAC Breed Seminar

<u>CAREER</u> - Following in his father's footsteps, Pharoah has already had a fairly distinguished career. He has been consistently successful in competition and has attracted the attention of local, national and international TV. His debut, at the tender age of 10 weeks, was with Rosemary Ford and Rolf Harris in the programme Cat Crazy II, he went on to be interviewed by Moscow TV. He has been awarded accolades both in the UK and abroad – including Australia. He won his title of Grand Champion on August 21st 2004 (and dedicated his win to the memory of his agent's loved ones) – he is believed to be the world's first GrCh Tabby Tonkinese male. Tonkaholics Lady Tabbyfir - Featured in the Eukanuba adverts with Mymystic Nimrod

Adfursh Milo – A huge boy who won Best of Breed at his first show – Pharoah looks forward to watching this lad's career.

Every kitten that I have is raised with all the loving attention that I can give it, I have spent many, many hours cleaning litter boxes, feeding, watering and worrying over each and everyone.

I spend hours on the phone, the internet and in person answering the questions of each perspective buyer. I answer the same questions time after time, even though that information is clearly listed on my website. Hi, well, I am now a fraction lighter!!

Everything went well on the journey down to Chatham. We caught an bus from the top here and so just connected with an earlier one to Chatham being there an hour early! We were therefore able to sit in the sun on a bench and then we went to Wickes (big DIY store close by) to have a look round - R bought a couple of things!! You know what men are like when they get in one of these stores! In the end I had to tell him that it was 10 o'clock and we had to start ambling back up the STEEP hill to the clinic.

TBC Recommendations For Breeders

In addition to the GCCF Code of Ethics the TBC strongly recommends that the following points are noted by owners of queens and studs. Remember that all GCCF registered breeders are now required to provide a copy of the GCCF Code of Ethics to each new owner of their kittens.

It is inadvisable to use a Tonkinese for breeding if it is on the REFerence register (with the exception of Tonkinese born before 01/05/1991 or Tonkinese variants that comply with the current registration policy).

2 A stud owner is not obliged to accept a queen to stud

3 Studs must be on the active register with the GCCF and must have their Certificate of Entirety (COE) lodged with the GCCF prior to the registration of their first litter. Stud owners should be able to show a copy of the COE to the queen's owner.

Studs, and visiting queens, should be vaccinated against Feline Enteritis and Cat 'Flu (but not within 14 days before the mating). Homeopathic vaccinations are not acceptable. Vaccination certificates should be available for inspection.

Studs must be regularly tested for FeLV and FIV, even if they are inoculated against FeLV. It is recommended that they are tested at least once per year and the documentation should be shown to the owners of visiting queens.

The stud owner **must** supply the following for the queen's owner: a). A mating certificate that complies with GCCF Section 1 Rule 3d.. b) A full pedigree of the stud showing at least three generations with full registration numbers. c) A receipt for the stud fee.

The stud owner must make clear any conditions relating to the kittens, or repeat matings, before the queen is left with the stud.

The stud premises should be available for inspection, by appointment, by the queen's owner prior to the queen being brought to stud.

9 Queens must be on the active register with the GCCF.

- It is recommended that queens are tested for FeLV and FIV within 24 hours before visiting the stud, unless from a fully tested household, and the documentation should be shown to the stud's owner.
- 11 Unaccompanied queens should not be accepted to stud (ie. sent by train, bus etc.)

The queen's owner has a responsibility to make arrangements, including the inspection of stud premises, well in advance of taking the queen to stud.

The queen's owner should be aware that the stud fee is for the services of the stud and is not based upon results - it should be offered at the time the queen is left with the stud.
