

Tonkinese kittens - how much is that pussy in the window?

We had an interesting discussion at our last committee meeting about the prices we all charged for our kittens. There was a consensus of opinion among the breeders present that £350 seemed to be a fair figure. This was based on stud fees, cost of food and litter, vaccinations etc. We would be really interested to hear of this is the price that other breeders are charging. Do you think it is a good idea for us to have a common price among ourselves or do you think it might change depending on whereabouts in the country you live?

PEDIGREE ARCHIVES - Urgent Appeal to you all.

As you know, the Club is still trying to build up a pedigree archive but the number of pedigrees supplied by breeders for this very valuable and unique asset during the past 3 years has numbered less than 10!

We KNOW that there have been more than 10 litters of Tonkinese kittens bred in this period — please, please breeders (and owners if you haven't done so already) send in a copy of your pedigree/s so that we can get our archive up to date. The information we have has already been of use to several breeders trying to correct details on their pedigrees or trace missing links—and even helped one breeder regain part of their lost breeding line. Several owners have used it to fill in gaps in their pedigree backgrounds and on one occasion it has helped us to re-home a Tonkinese.

We know that some people have concerns about passing on registration numbers, if this is what's preventing you from contributing to the archives please feel free to omit the last 3 digits of your registration numbers (we do need to know the letters) —but let us try, as a Club, to have as comprehensive a record as we possibly can. Send a copy of your pedigree/s to the Hon.Secretary (address on page 2), ideally list the names of all kittens in the litter (with their colours and coat-patterns) on the pedigree.

—and thank you for taking the time to do this.

If your Tonk has earned a title the Club will be delighted to award you a congratulatory certificate to hang on your wall. My Very Special holiday - Kathy Wilkinson

Background: A few years ago I got on to the internet research a problem we had with the cats. I then joined the Tonkinese group and 'met' a lot of interesting and helpful people and seemed to 'click' well with one lady named Jeanine Grobbelaar and she lives in Cape Town, South Africa. We were, and still are of course, very good friends with another lady, Christine Richards, also on the group and who also shows a lot in the UK. We all 3 emailed lots and lots privately and gradually starting phoning South Africa.

At the beginning of 2002 we'd been talking about the Supreme show and the National show, and Christine and Jeanine would talk about breeding, and as you do, we would talk/email about what we would do if we met up, what we would do and show each other. Then one day Jeanine DID it. Yes, she booked to come and stay with Christine and myself and attend both these shows. More importantly she would take back a kitten to South Africa when she returned and that kitten, Tatiana, is the first British bred Tonkinese to have achieved a title. She has also given Jeanine some beautiful kittens.

So Jeanine had her holiday over here – tremendous fun for all of us, trying to show her as much of England as we could – and remember this was in November and December so the weather wasn't too good. Mind you, Jeanine would have been over the moon if we'd had snow while she was here! Then the following year she came to our First Championship show as Official Photographer.

THEN last year I went to visit her.

I cannot find the right words to describe the holiday I had. It was unbelievable to meet up with her lovely human and feline family who I knew so much about from our emails and talks, but to meet them in the flesh and fur was fantastic. Tatiana has matured into a lovely cat and was looking after a litter of kittens while I was there. I was made to feel so very welcome and nothing was too much trouble – the plans that had been made!!

I do not have the space to tell you more than a little about my holiday, and so am going to tell you about part of the trip away from Cape Town. This was kept as a complete surprise – my hostess and her family would slip into Afrikaans to talk about things so that I wouldn't know what plans they were hatching!!

We left early on Monday morning, had breakfast at Hermanus and were fortunate to see some whales – early in the breeding season - but we couldn't linger as we had a distance to go and other places to visit en route to our destination – which was being kept a secret from me. The scenery was terrific and so changeable – I could spend pages trying to tell you about the scenery – the pictures I took on holiday filled 5 cds!

It was mid-afternoon when we turned off the road and arrived at a Game Lodge – I couldn't believe we were going to stay in such a lovely place. It was fantastic – here is a picture of Tania walking down to the rondavels. It was very atmospheric – but I was a bit worried about finding certain 'things' in there and so Jeanine inspected it first. There was a mosquito net over each bed too, so of course I had to sleep under that – Jeanine has since told me that she found a 'thing' on the net and removed it before I found out. I am SO grateful that she did this. The first morning was rather misty and so Tania and Jeanine said that we should visit the Cango Caves and the ostrich farm that day and perhaps fit 'something else' in if time allowed. This was said with grins on their faces and chattering in Afrikaans – little did I know what was in store!

We saw ostriches in fields as we went up to the Cango Caves and actually had to stop while a flock of them were moved down and across the road. Jeanine and Tania had told me how beautiful the caves are and they were absolutely right. Jeanine stayed outside as she was feeling a little asthmatic, so Tania and I went in with a group. Words cannot describe their beauty and how insignificant we felt. Here is a picture of Tania and I with the guide after the tour had finished.

Then on the way back we went into an Ostrich farm. Even though there were just 3 of us we were made to feel very welcome, offered a cup of coffee and then shown around. Baby ostriches are so sweet. Here is picture of me holding one – I was worried that it might have an accident down me and I think that shows! Their feet are really odd.

We were taken out and shown other ostriches of various ages, including a couple that were sitting on eggs – they take it in turns, VERY modern and New Age Man-type of thing. Seriously, the male ostrich takes a big part in rearing the babies. However, although invited to do so, none of us had been willing to ride an ostrich! That certainly would have been a photo to show people though wouldn't it? Such attractive birds but they have tiny brains – the guide told us that their eye is actually larger than their brain. The eggs are very strong – they can bear a person's weight, even mine! *Picture 4*

After looking at the birds we looked around the showroom where there were the most beautiful products – beautiful etched or painted ostrich eggs, lamps made from egg shells, all sorts of leather products available (ostrich leather is the most expensive in the world), boas and feather dusters too. Amazing, every part is used. Ostrich meat is delicious – I'd tried that for lunch at the Caves!! Then we got back in the car and drove away and not that far away we turned into a place called Cango Wildlife Park. I thought to myself that we were going to see some more animals that we probably wouldn't be able to see easily in the wild – Jeanine and I had been to a small private zoo in Cape Town and seen some African Wild Cats, yes, the ancestors of our own felines (quite like 'ordinary' tabbies!).

At this point I had no idea of what was to come.

We waited for the tour to begin – all 3 of us getting worried in the meantime about a beautiful peacock that was in a crocodile enclosure, but apparently it does this all the time and obviously hadn't ended up on the menu yet. The crocodiles were enormous and I have some close-up pictures of them – their skin is remarkable. The guide was very knowledgeable and very friendly. First of all there were meerkats, a snake house (didn't go in there!), pot bellied pigs, and then we came to a couple of young cheetah cubs in an enclosure!! Wow, I thought, my favourite big cat and I actually managed to stroke some fur sticking through the wire. Naughty I thought, but I did it anyway. On we went, and then we came to a special part where the guide explained that we would be seeing their big cats, and that they had some white tiger cubs – my heart started beating faster here and Jeanine and Tania were smiling at my reaction, but I wasn't really listening properly at this point, I just wanted to go see the cats! But then it got through to me that he was saying that there would be an opportunity to go in with the tiger cubs or cheetah cubs at the end of the tour. Right I thought, we're on for that.

So we went up on to a boardwalk at the top of the enclosures. The white tiger cubs were beautiful and larger ones were next door. Then there was a mountain lion, then a jaguar, a 'regular' tiger and some lions, and then some cheetah cubs! At that point the guide said that if anyone was interested in going in with any of the cubs that we would be able to do this at the end of the tour—which was nearly over. That was it, I didn't wait to see the Fennec foxes but was off to see what was involved in getting the 3 of us in to see the cheetahs. Tania and Jeanine told me afterwards that they were amazed at the speed I took off at 'on a mission'.

Well, we each had to complete a form and agree to do exactly as we were told when we were in the enclosure – keep very quiet, keep together, only touch head and shoulders. We decided that we would go in with both the sets of cheetah cubs and not the tigers – it was a lot more expensive to go in with the tigers and we shall be to go in with the tigers.

to go in with the tigers and we couldn't manage all 3 experiences.

Words cannot express how I felt whilst we were in with the cheetah cubs – we went in with the older ones first. I just felt as though I had a stupid grin on my face the whole time – actually the photos show that I DID have a stupid grin on my face all the time. I thought I was going to burst with happiness, I could have cried.

Here is a picture of me with a larger cub, It was amazing to feel this beautiful creature purring. The fur was coarse but silky at the same time, especially the little bit of kitten fur that it still had.

The younger ones had ordinary cat toys in with them, but we weren't allowed to try and play with them with these. Again the difference in the longer 'baby' fur and the other fur was amazing. *Picture 7*

As the staff were waiting to shut the park for the night we then had to leave and go back to the Game Lodge for a lovely meal – oh I could write another article just on the food I ate whilst on holiday!

Conclusion: I have read back through this description of a particular day of my trip and have to apologise to you. I feel as though I have just been making skimpy notes of what happened. There is no way that I can explain the excitement of doing the things that we did, experiencing the colours and textures of everything. I met some wonderful people on my trip and did some fantastic things – including seeing African Wild Cats, penguins, standing at the farthest point of the African continent, paddling in the Indian Ocean (COLD!), going to the top of Table Mountain, judging at a cat show, being present at the birth of some kittens (only my second time), and so very much more. Words cannot express my gratitude to Jeanine and her family for letting me stay with them and taking the time to plan such wonderful experiences for me.



TBC Recommendations For Breeders

In addition to the GCCF Code of Ethics the TBC strongly recommends that the following points are noted by owners of queens and studs. Remember that all GCCF registered breeders are now required to provide a copy of the GCCF Code of Ethics to each new owner of their kittens.

1 It is inadvisable to use a Tonkinese for breeding if it is on the REFerence register (with the exception of Tonkinese born before 01/05/1991 or Tonkinese variants that comply with the current registration policy).

2 A stud owner is not obliged to accept a queen to stud

3 Studs must be on the active register with the GCCF and must have their Certificate of Entirety (COE) lodged with the GCCF prior to the registration of their first litter. Stud owners should be able to show a copy of the COE to the gueen's owner.

Studs, and visiting queens, should be vaccinated against Feline Enteritis and Cat 'Flu (but not within 14 days before the mating). Homeopathic vaccinations are not acceptable. Vaccination certificates should be available for inspection.

Studs must be regularly tested for FeLV and FIV, even if they are inoculated against FeLV. It is recommended that they are tested at least once per year and the documentation should be shown to the owners of visiting gueens.

- The stud owner **must** supply the following for the queen's owner: a). A mating certificate that complies with GCCF Section 1 Rule 3d.. b) A full pedigree of the stud showing at least three generations with full registration numbers. c) A receipt for the stud fee.
- 7 The stud owner must make clear any conditions relating to the kittens, or repeat matings, before the queen is left with the stud.
- The stud premises should be available for inspection, by appointment, by the queen's owner prior to the queen being brought to stud.

9 Queens must be on the active register with the GCCF.

- 10 It is recommended that queens are tested for FeLV and FIV within 24 hours before visiting the stud, unless from a fully tested household, and the documentation should be shown to the stud's owner.
- 11 Unaccompanied queens should not be accepted to stud (ie. sent by train, bus etc.)

The queen's owner has a responsibility to make arrangements, including the inspection of stud premises, well in advance of taking the queen to stud.

The queen's owner should be aware that the stud fee is for the services of the stud and is not based upon results - it should be offered at the time the queen is left with the stud.
