


Please remember that we can never have too many volunteers. If you have any skills or spare time that you can offer please let myself or Linda Vousden know. Thank you.

Important Tonkinese BAC Open Meeting

St Marys Church Hall, Winnersh, Berkshire. Sunday September 2nd, from 1pm

The Tonkinese Breed Advisory Committee invites you to attend an open meeting to discuss the way ahead for the Tonkinese—all three coat-patterns. The TBAC is seeking your active support for the promotion of the solid and pointed coat-patterned Tonks. The meeting will include an explanation of the promotion process, information on what steps the TBAC have taken so far and an open discussion on the project.

Although the GCCF requires all breed promotion to be managed by the relevant BAC, it is impossible for a BAC to achieve breed advancement without the active support of those involved with the breed. So are you content for two thirds of our Tonkinese to be kept by the wayside—or are you prepared to do something about it?

Tonkinese Archives

Linda Vousden

Many of you know just how addictive the 'sport' of Line-Chasing can be. Hours may be spent looking for that tiny piece of information to fill a gap. I've been compiling my own Tonkinese databases since I first

came into the breed in 1991, they include info on UK and International Tonks. I'm also the official archivist for the Tonkinese BAC and Tonkinese Breed Club—so please remember to send me details of your litters to add to this valuable Tonkinese resource.

At the AGM this year I mentioned that it would be useful to be able to share the information on-line, but it was suggested that some breeders would oppose this—the only reason given for possible opposition was that such an on-line resource might be of interest to the Inland Revenue, however since the IR consider cat breeding to be a hobby, unlike dog breeding which they consider to be a business, this argument isn't sound.

At one time the publication of registration numbers was of concern, but since a GCCF rule was approved (requiring breeders to provide mating certificates when registering their kittens) this is no longer an issue.

There are numerous breed databases on-line now including Burmese, Siamese, La Perm, Bengal, Ocicat etc. I would be very interested to hear from anyone who has a constructive point to make—either for or against the idea of such a Tonkinese resource being more easily available.

While working on the Archives I often come across errors in pedigrees, here are some corrections that you might like to note for your own records:-


STANDARD OF POINTS— The GCCF Executive have approved the following changes proposed by the TBAC, they are now on the agenda of the June Council meeting for ratification.

a. The word 'self' is to replace the word 'solid' where it refers to colour in a cat that is neither Tabby-patterned nor Tortoiseshell. The replacement will occur in: The heading, following the section on withholding certificates etc.; Sentence 3 of the 1st paragraph that is to be headed 'Self Colours'; Sentence 1 of the 1st paragraph of the Tabby Pattern description; Sentence 5 of the 1st paragraph of the Tabby Pattern description.

b. The last two sentences of the 'Tabby-Pattern, Head Markings' description to be amended to read: "The nose and paw pad leather may be pinkish outlined with colour, or more solid in colour. The nose and paw pad leathers should match in colour tone".

EXHIBITORS GUIDE—TBAC has produced an Exhibitor's Guide, this is an "in-house" supplement to the SOP to help exhibitors select the best cats for showing. It is available as a downloadable (horrible word!) .pdf file from the Tonkinese Breed Club web site, TBAC page. If you do not have access to the internet and would like a copy just send a SAE to Linda Vousden (see committee list for address).

LIMPING SYNDROME IN KITTENS

Have you ever had a kitten develop a limp and/or mouth problems after its vaccinations, and taken it to a vet who

can't find any reason for it? I have, on two occasions with two different vets – yet there is a mass of information available on the link between Calicivirus and limping cats/kittens!

Recently one of our members had just such a harrowing experience. Despite having an otherwise excellent vet she nearly lost her kitten as a result of her veterinary practice's lack of knowledge, or lack of experience, of the limping syndrome - or other side effects of vaccination. When she took the trouble to contact the manufacturers (Intervet) they were very helpful but, surprisingly, had very few reports of the problem – not because there had been so few cases but because there had been so little feedback from vets. So if you should encounter this problem, or any resulting from your kittens vaccinations, please make sure that your vet completes the appropriate 'yellow card' feedback form for the manufacturer—or feedback the information yourself, it will be accepted by the manufacturers!

Here is a little information for you on the syndrome – the Feline Advisory Bureau also has an information sheet on "Limping Syndrome and Feline Calicivirus Infection" and there numerous web sites – to read and even pass on to your vet if you feel so inclined (e.g. http://www.ava.com.au/avj/mar97/209.htm)

It is **well** document that Feline Calicivirus (FCV) is associated with chronic gingivitis, lameness, swollen joints and arthritis, and is likely to cause gastrointestinal disorder. It is one of the infections that contributes to feline respiratory disease - this is why we vaccinate our kittens against FCV. The occurrence of severe viral upper respiratory disease is rare in properly vaccinated adult cats.

There are many forms of feline calicivirus. Some induce little more than salivation and ulceration of the mouth or nostrils; others produce pneumonia. Two different strains may produce a short-lived limping syndrome without signs of ulceration or pneumonia. These strains produce a transient fever, alternating leg lameness, and pain when the affected joint is handled. Signs occur most often in 8- to 12-wk-old kittens and usually resolve without treatment. The reason that the syndrome may occur in kittens vaccinated against FCV is because no vaccine protects against both of the strains that produce the limping syndrome.

Limping syndrome has been noted in kittens, and some breeds of dog such as Weimaraners and Akitas, after the use of products containing caliciviral or Chlamydophila antigens. Kittens less than 6 months old are usually affected for up to 1 week after vaccination.

Neurologic disease has also been a commonly documented post-vaccinal reaction described in cats. Modified live vaccines should not be used in kittens less than 4 to 5 weeks of age, cerebellar degeneration may develop in kittens from virulent MLV vaccine virus infection.

By the way, caliciviruses are host-specific so FCV poses no risk to humans.

David was keen to adopt him and so we agreed to transfer ownership (and update his chip), so his official address is still St Albans; however I know of several 'holiday homes' that he continues to visit regularly, including our own! DO IT YOURSELF GEL PACK

At some time we all have use for a gel pack, the kind that doesn't freeze solid and is used to put

From Bald Patch to Grand Champion!

Back in 2005 my foundation queen Champion Fecheldee

Chailai Titaya developed a yellow-orange patch on her fur between her shoulders. I firstly put it down to some lilies that I had been given. I had locked them away in the spare room so that the cats could not get at them but I assumed that Taya had nipped in and just thanked my lucky stars that she was ok and that she just had a mark on her coat.

I started to question my assumption of what had caused this when the mark was there six months later. During this six months Taya had her first litter of kittens and was ready to get back on the bench. In her first outing she received her first Grand Certificate but that was to be her last for some time as the patch on her neck got darker and more obvious. It was about February 2005 that I first noticed that the hair had started to fall out. I still thought it was the lilies as they can cause all sorts of problems. Judges started to notice and put it down to vaccine reaction, which had me thinking, had my judgement been wrong? What was causing this?

By the end of March the patch was bald and the size of a 1p coin so she missed out on a trip to the Jersey Show and it was time for a visit to the vets where they said that there was a granular feel to the patch and would have to operate. My heart sank, no-one wants their fur-baby to go in for surgery if it can be helped.



I had already planned for Taya to have her second litter of kittens and the vet was happy to wait until she had had the kittens and they were weaned before the surgery was done. So off Taya went to stud and had 5 lovely kittens in July.

Time was ticking by and I had to have her booked in for the op. She went in to the vets on 1 September 2006 and the operation went well. My wonderful vet said that she had tried to be extra neat with the stitches as she knows that I wanted Taya to get back on the show bench! Despite this I was horrified when they brought Taya back to me and saw the size of the scar! It was 3 inches long!!! We were told to put a T-shirt on her to stop her or her kittens getting the stitches. We had to drive past Mothercare on the way home so I popped in to buy baby tops.

I asked where I could find the premature baby clothes and was asked is it for a boy or a girl? I said 'its for my cat!' and explained. The staff were so helpful and I





came away with a baby-grow and a T-shirt from their sale rack! We got Taya home, where we took these photos, still in disbelief of the size of the area that was shaved and the length of the stitches!

We had to take Taya back to the vets for a check up on the 5th September where they were pleased with how the wound was healing. She went back again for her stitches out on the 11th. By this time we had found Taya's fleece hoodie we bought for a laugh at a show and the vets were so impressed with this Taya had to do a beauty parade to the vet nurses at the practice!

Now for the scientific bit! At this visit to the vets the results were back from histology. They concluded that the area removed was a 'mineralising focal Panniculitis', which was explained as calcified lymphoid and connective tissue which was likely to have been caused by previous injections. The vet thought that the most likely cause was the Delvosterone hormone injection she had had in 2004.

The wound healed very well and the fur grew back nicely although it was, as expected, darker than before. Taya's first show back on the bench was at the Tonkinese Breed Club show in October where she did fantastically by getting Best of Breed. The patch on her back was noted by one judge but it did not stop her!

Taya then went on to win the Grand Challenge Certificate at the National Cat Club Show in December and obtained her third on 10th February 2007 at the Croydon Cat Club Show to gain her Grand Champion Title! I was over the moon, my baby had achieved the title, the first self to do so!

We now embark on our next mission together, the Imperial title!!



THE CLUB SHOW - 2006

"Been there, done that" is one of those clichés that cannot be applied to running a cat show! Each show has its own trials and tribulations – among

other things poor Kathy had visions of spending the day before the show making up special cards bearing the legend "I Owe You a Rosette", or at the very least making an imaginative range of pink, blue and yellow tissue paper rosettes — but the rosettes did turn up and were a feast for the eyes as they sparkled and tantalised cat and owner alike. This year, for the first year in many, I was able to attend the Tonkinese Breed Club Show as an exhibitor instead of Show Management and it was a delight. Once again my hat goes off to the seemingly tireless volunteers who take on the awful task of putting a cat show together. Gill Cornish (our new Show Manager) and Kathy Wilkinson (our new Assistant Show Manager) gave us a show that was a credit to them.

It was a pleasure to see so many new exhibitors supporting the breed show with their cherished cats, and that the number of entries for this our 4th Championship show had once again increased slightly on the previous year. The colours and patterns was well represented; I even saw my first classic tortie/tabby Tonk – Gill Rayson's sweet natured kitten, Hushpad Pussy Willow.

Kathy has a knack of finding the most generous sponsors for the show - every exhibit was greeted with a pen stuffed with food and we had to book double pens for the BIS winners to store their huge pile of goodies, including a personalised teddy bear from Chris Richards who provided the Club with its new BIS pen drapes. In the past few years wonderful Best of Breed prizes have been donated by different Committee members, hand painted glassware, an exquisite sea-horse glass for our under-sea theme and this year Liz Case and Jo Whittington donated special pewter cat clocks to each BOB winner.

It was a good opportunity to promote the TBC's new CD (not musical but a collection of important documentation and over 30 different Tonkinese notelets). I ran a 'Tonkinese Picture Parade' show on the wall behind the Club table and the CDs sold very well. Besides the CDs there was a stunning 2007 Tonkinese Calendar, produced by Valerie Chapple.

There were many success stories but there is no doubt that the day belonged to Diana and Tommy Bishop. It was thanks to the initial efforts of Diana, Tommy and the late Mary Hodgkinson that the Tonkinese were recognised by the GCCF in 1991. So, their success at our show is well deserved. GrPr Episcopuss lanthe (74j) was made up to Imperial GrPr; she is our second ImpGrPr Tonkinese (our first was Karen Durden's lilac tortie, Ch & ImpGrPr Shinarha Enola Gay). Then, Ch Episcopuss Quirita (74p) was awarded her second GCC and won Best Of Breed – she went on to win Best In Show Adult and finally Overall Best In Show – what a triumph!

The BIS Kitten (and BOB) was Nikita Richards's chocolate-tabby female, Tonkaholic Superstar, bred by Chris & Jo Richards.

The BIS Neuter (and BOB) was Coral & Vince Macey's cream female, Ch Romantica Carina, bred by Rosemary Harper.



The other three BOB winners were -

Adult - Liz Case's lilac female, Ch Fecheldee Titaya, bred by Coral & Vince Macey.

Kitten - Liz Case's own bred chocolate female, Tarjjika Yemaya.

Neuter - Valerie Chapple's brown male, Pr Mymystic Pagansun, bred by Linda Vousden.

CLEANING THE WATERBOWL

If you live in an area of hard water, as I do, and find that your

cats' water-bowls are regularly rimmed with lime-scale, no matter how hard you scrub them, just try this:-

Fill the bowl to the brim with white wine vinegar (not malt) and leave it for 20 minutes.

you can use the same vinegar for several bowls in one session. After 20 minutes you'll be able to wash your bowl clean of lime-scale with no effort! Tip the used vinegar down the sink or into the lavatory—to make full use of its cleaning power!

White wine vinegar is very cheap, its much better for the environment than chemical lime-scale removers (which I wouldn't use on my cats' bowls anyway!) and its great for cleaning taps, windows etc. Not to mention that it makes a tasty salad dressing mixed with a little olive oil and lemon jiuce.

If You Are Allergic to Cats Will Your Children Be Too?

Not necessarily—according to research conducted at the Henry Ford Hospital, in Detroit. Allergy test were administered to 724 children pre-natally, at birth and at regular intervals until the children were 7 yrs of age. They found that children exposed to cats in their infancy may be at less risk of developing paediatric allergies.

These results are contrary to the traditional recommendations that expectant parents, who have a history of allergies, should avoid having a pet in the home to reduce the risk of allergies for their children. The studies also showed that pet-exposed infants had overall lower antibody levels and fewer positive skin test reactions to dogs, ragweed, grass and dust mites.

TBC Recommendations For Breeders

Updated 2005

In addition to the GCCF Code of Ethics the TBC strongly recommends that the following points are noted by owners of queens and studs.

If breeding from a Tonkinese on the REFerence register, ensure that it complies with the current Tonkinese Registration Policy - some cats are on the REFerence register because they have ancestors that are not permitted in the Tonkinese breed programme (eg. Orientals or cats of unregistered or unknown parentage).

2 A stud owner is not obliged to accept a queen to stud

Studs must be on the active register with the GCCF and must have their Certificate of Entirety (COE) lodged with the GCCF prior to the registration of their first litter. Stud owners should be able to show a copy of the COE to the queen's owner.

Studs, and visiting queens, should be vaccinated against Feline Enteritis and Cat 'Flu (but not within 14 days before the mating). Homeopathic vaccinations are not acceptable. Vaccination certificates should be available for inspection.

Studs must be regularly tested for FeLV and FIV, even if they are inoculated against FeLV. It is recommended that they are tested at least once per year and

the documentation should be shown to the owners of visiting queens.

The stud owner **must** supply the following for the queen's owner: a). A mating certificate that complies with GCCF Section 1 Rule 3d.. b) A full pedigree of the stud showing at least three generations with full registration numbers. c) A receipt for the stud fee.

7 The stud owner must make clear any conditions relating to the kittens, or repeat

matings, before the queen is left with the stud.

The stud premises should be available for inspection, by appointment, by the queen's owner prior to the queen being brought to stud.

9 Queens must be on the active register with the GCCF.

It is recommended that queens are tested for FeLV and FIV within 24 hours before visiting the stud, unless from a fully tested household, and the documentation should be shown to the stud's owner.

11 Unaccompanied queens should not be accepted to stud (ie. sent by train, bus etc.)

The queen's owner has a responsibility to make arrangements, including the inspection of stud premises, well in advance of taking the queen to stud.

- The queen's owner should be aware that the stud fee is for the services of the stud and is not based upon results it should be offered at the time the queen is left with the stud
- The breeder **must supply** each kitten owner with a copy of the GCCF code of ethics; a valid vaccination certificate showing that the full course has been completed for Enteritis and cat 'flu; a properly completed pedigree certificate that includes at least three generations with full registration numbers and the pink registration certificate duly signed by the breeder for transfer of ownership
