



Extracts from the AGM

Tonkinese Breed Club Show.

Kathy Wilkinson had exciting news for the 2009 show. A well known and respected South African Tonkinese Judge, Dr J Lamprecht, who judges all over the world, might be available and willing to judge at the Tonkinese Breed Club show.

The less exciting news is that in the current economic climate sponsorship and 'extras' for the competitors are difficult to get. If you know of any firms or organisations that might be willing to donate something, however small, please let Kathy Wilkinson know.

The show will be held at Bracknell Leisure Centre on 31 October 2009. Don't forget to put it in your diary! The theme is witches and wizards, but please don't scare the cats.

News from the Tonkinese Breed Advisory Committee

A Tonkinese registration policy has been drafted to wipe out the 'stigma' of 'variant Tonkinese'. The revised policy accepts solid and pointed coat pattern Tonks as Tonkinese. A standard of points has been drafted to include solids and pointeds. At their last meeting the BAC decided to submit the application to the GCCF for recognition of solids and pointeds. Linda Vousden has worked like a Trojan to complete the application and it has been submitted to the GCCF. *Keep your fingers crossed folks!*

News from the Governing Council of the Cat Fancy

"Our Cats" magazine dominated much of the year. Now that the magazine is no longer being published the GCCF are putting Judges' Reports on their website. Have a look at www.gccfcats.org. (I went there whilst writing this. Sadly I saw that "The Tonkinese *Cat* Club" apparently had a show on the 25 October 2008. I followed the link anyway only to find an error report. Well it was appropriate!)

The GCCF allows show classes for pedigree pets from 1 June 2009. Household Pets are split into Pedigree and Non-Pedigree Pets. Cats can compete for Master Cat, Grand Master Cat and Imperial Grand Master Cat titles.

One of the members said that she was having problems with getting her kittens correctly registered with the GCCF. (see "Correct registration of Tonkinese" item at the end of this article)

Rule changes passed

Rule 9 a) second sentence was "All matters for the agenda must be received by the Honorary Secretary before 28th February; the agenda shall be posted together with other relevant papers to the membership not less than 28 days before the meeting."

Rule 9 a) second sentence changed to "All matters for the agenda must be received by the Honorary Secretary before 28th February; the agenda shall be *sent* together with other relevant papers to the membership not less than 28 days before the meeting."

Rule 9 b) second sentence was "Such a meeting shall be called within 1 calendar month of the Honorary Secretary receiving the request and the papers shall be posted to all fully paid up members not less than 14 days before the meeting."

Rule 9 b) second sentence changed to "Such a meeting shall be called within 1 calendar month of the Honorary Secretary receiving the request and the papers shall be *sent* to all fully paid up members not less than 14 days before the meeting."

Rule 10 a) was "The President and Vice President/s shall be proposed by the Committee, and elected by a simple majority vote of the members at an AGM and shall hold office for a period of three years, after which time they may be eligible for re-election."

Rule 10 a) changed to "The President and Vice President/s shall be proposed by the Committee, and elected by a simple majority vote of the members at an AGM. They shall remain in office unless either a



Committee proposal to remove them from office is approved by a simple majority at an AGM or they have contravened GCCF or the Club Rules."

The updated Rules will be on the TBC website very soon.

Other items

Please support the Tonkinese Cat Club's first championship show to be held on 30 May 2009 at Bracknell Leisure Centre.

Many are concerned about the low numbers of studs available for mating queens and Julia Craig-McFeely is constantly working to increase the Tonkinese bloodlines. There are new studs available with no links to existing lines. Have a look at her article "New Tonkinese bloodlines" for more information.

Have a look at the TBC website. There is all sorts of wonderful information, news, pictures I followed a link to 9 January 2009 edition of Our Cats to see the report of the 2008 TBC show. Absolutely Brilliant!

Correct registration of Tonkinese can be a problem so make sure you know the registration policy inside out and back to front. The policy is on the website as is Linda's guide to understanding the policy. If still in doubt ask another Tonkinese breeder. There are many existing breeders who will help. If you have problems getting the correct registration first speak to the GCCF. If there are still problems speak to one of the BAC reps or write to the TBAC Secretary, Linda Vousden, with a copy of the kitten's pedigree and registration documents (enclose a stamped addressed envelope for a reply). I found this information on the website too.

Know anyone who wants kittens or do you get phone calls asking for kittens and you don't have any? Direct them to the website. It's what I always do when I get enquiries and don't have any kittens. There is a kitten list there.

Next committee meeting will be on the 14 June. So let one of the committee know if there is something you want raised or something you want us to do.

The breeder awards went to: Linda Vousden for GrCh Mymystic Pharoah (adult male), Hilary Goodburn for Hylily Yasmine Yashoda (adult female), Cara White for Elpidos Tabby Tiger (kitten) and Hilary Goodburn for Hylily Kalakar Kemedi (neuter male).

There were also a number of Red Card Day winners, a result that is always satisfying for the owners and breeders: Amanda Lachlan's Jablook Yokota-Issabella (74c), Cara White's Elpidos Artemis Adored (74t) and Elpidos Tabby Tiger (74nt) and Linda Vousden's GrCh Mymystic Pharoah (74at).

On a personal note, it was Mymystic Pharoah's last adult show. He was neutered after the show following over 10 years of devoted stud service to the breed, so it was agreeable to see him leave 'adultdom' with a red card day. Thank you to all those who have wished him well.

The show was a good opportunity for judges to see the three Tonkinese coat-patterns, mink, solid and pointed, together. There were some gorgeous cats on exhibition, including several with Tonkinese pointed or solid coat-patterns, with excellent Tonkinese type and helping to dispel the myth that Tonks with these coat-patterns look like anything other than Tonks! Maria Chapman awarded the trophy for 'Best Tonkinese Type with AOV Coat-Pattern' to the glamorous Brown male, Mimaperks Perkins Saturnus owned and bred by Catherine Bernard and family. The best-decorated exhibition pen award went to Liz Case with Tarjjika Cobweb, a very pretty pointed Brown Tortie.

As ever our Judges & Stewards were gentle and considerate with our cats and appeared to enjoy themselves. Sharing the hall with the Ocicat and Bengal Cat Club show is always a pleasure and we look forward to seeing them next year. However we were sorry that Helen Hewitt was not well enough to be with us and we all wish her well and hope that, following her recent stay in hospital, she is firmly on the road to recovery.

Every year there is a core of exhibitors without whom our shows would certainly be poorer events - some have entered/exhibited one or more cats in almost every one of the Clubs shows since our first Exemption show back in 1996. It is a pleasure to see how this core has grown with new generations of both cats and exhibitors.

I can't finish before thanking, on the Club's behalf, the TBC Committee and the many volunteers who helped to man the Show Manager's, Club, Trophy and Rescue tables, the vetting-in marshals, the tombola and our young team of efficient rosette runners (India, Nikita and Phillipa).

The TBC has had various show themes over the years, this year it returned to the Club colour – 'Aquamarine' (the colour of our cats' eyes of course). I've heard a few whispered ideas for our next show – all of which will make for an interesting day and colourful show-report photos. 
WHAT'S HAPPENING ABOUT OUR SOLID AND POINTED TONKS?

Unless you live on a different planet I'm sure you know that the TBAC submitted an application to the GCCF for the Preliminary recognition of our solid and pointed Tonkinese i.e. for their right to be shown in competition, beginning in Assessment classes. The application was on the agenda for the Executive meeting of May 6th. Unfortunately some items on the agenda took so long that our application was deferred until the next meeting.

This is only a setback if it keeps happening. Meanwhile it gives us time to reinforce our message that TONKINESE DO NOT HAVE VARIANTS, THEY HAVE THREE COAT-PATTERNS. The solid and pointed patterns cannot be considered variant because they are not recessive patterns and cannot be bred out!

If you attend a cat-show (showing or visiting), or any other GCCF event, please wear a 'Tonkinese Have 3!' badge. We really need to raise the profile of our campaign and get as much support as possible - from everyone.

If you can put a solid or pointed Tonk on exhibition it will help the cause. Do You Know Your Committee Members?



Cat Burglar Prefers Knickers Over Necklaces

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho -- Guard your knickers -- Jack the cat is on the prowl.

For the past few months, the 1-year-old Domestic Shorthair has been stocking up on clothing and accessories, leaving the stray items on his owner's stoop.

Judy Waring, of Couer d'Alene, says she doesn't know how the 10-pound cat managed to drag a hoodie sweatshirt home, let alone a heavy, long rope, with a hook attached to it.

"It started Halloween night," Waring explained. "I found a feather boa at our deck door, and I didn't know where it came from, so I pitched it.

"That was followed by a man's leather glove, and I threw that out, too. But then I saved everything else, because I could see it was Jack bringing it home and I thought it was interesting."

Jack has since amassed a considerable collection of garments, including men's briefs, bikini bottoms and T-shirts, as well as other items like a back brace and a foam neck cushion.

"His personal record is four gloves left at the front door, and two at the back, in one night," Waring said.

Jack delivered his 29th glove to Waring two days ago.

"I love the guy, so when he sits proudly next to something on the front step or the back deck, I go out and say, 'Jack, how did you know that this is just what I wanted?' He eats it up. He is a nice boy," Waring said.

Jack's looting habit has earned him some nationwide publicity -- a video of him has appeared on CNN, as well as Good Morning America.

Waring says she doesn't know where Jack's "motherload" is. Figuring someone must be missing some of the snatched goods, Waring recently placed them on a clothing line outside her house. She also posted a sign, asking the public to take whatever belongs to them.

The clothes were displayed for three days, but no one took the bait. So, Waring boarded the items back into a giant plastic tub, which she says Jack likes to eye from time to time.

Jack's owner says she would rather the cat concentrate on hunting birds or other wildlife, as then he would be less likely to stray far from the backyard, crossing potentially dangerous streets.

But Waring says that keeping Jack contained in the house is out of the question -- "It's in his blood," she explained of his propensity to roam.

And following him on a late-night expedition is not a plausible solution, either.

"I've thought about tracking him one night, but thinking about it is only as far as it got," Waring said.

"He would see me and turn around and then follow me, instead. I don't think it will work. It'll have to remain a mystery."



Jack apparently has a kindred feline spirit in the 'Land Down Under' -- a cat named Cisco is reportedly causing some mischief of his own in Mosman, Australia.

The 6-year-old Tonkinese cat also regularly delivers socks, shirts, toys and, yes, undergarments to his owner.

"I've been trying to find the owners," the cat's owner, Peter Hand, reportedly said. "One lady asked if I had her swimmers. She was delighted to get them back."

New Tonkinese bloodlines



Although many people are concerned about the small number of bloodlines available in our gene pool, there are a number of new young studs coming either directly from first-generation breeding, or from lines which have not outcrossed to the existing gene pool. The following studs may be of interest to anyone looking for a line that does not cross with your own:

Rameses Chaos - All Rameses lines, no outcrosses to other lines (F2 blue tabby Mink, carrying chocolate) - presently with Julia Craig- McFeely in Oxford, but will probably be neutered by the end of the year unless there is sufficient demand for him. He has been a slow starter, and has only just worked out how to mate, but the kittens he has sired (16 of them) have been superb. 


TONKS AND THEIR TOYS (submitted by Val Chapple).

Obtaining birth control pills for your cat

I know that Ovarid is becoming increasingly difficult to obtain. Many veterinary practices no longer keep it as they do not have enough people wanting it before it's use-by date.

Let's face it at a quarter of a pill a day we do not buy very much at a time.

One of my friends wants Ovarid and her vet no longer stocks it – but my veterinary practice does. I phoned my veterinary practice and if she takes a written prescription from her vet to them they will dispense Ovarid against this written prescription. Of course, she has to phone them before going, just to check that they actually have it in stock at the time.

So if your vet does not stock Ovarid and you need it, find a friend who's vet does keep it and see if you can also obtain it by giving them a written prescription.

As an alternative, I am told that you can use a birth control pill for dogs but it is much larger than the cat version. So you have to cut it into eighths and this is a very messy and inaccurate business.



Sue Amor, our Chairperson, has done just that and would like to share the following with you:

When I was 18 I decided I wanted to donate my blood to help others. I was very idealistic and my mum gave blood so I decided to do the same. It wasn't an unpleasant experience and at the end of the donation they made a big fuss of me and you had a free cup of tea and biscuits. I can still remember my feeling of pride the first time I heard an ambulance after that donation. I remember wondering if that was

my pint of blood going off to save someone!

I continued to give blood twice a year through my time at teacher training college and only stopped when I became pregnant with my first child as they wouldn't take your blood then or for a year after. I didn't start giving blood then until my second child was three. Once you get out of the habit it's very easy to forget. The trigger to get me donating again was when I saw someone with a posh bronze badge for having given 10 pints of blood. I am very competitive when I can see a reward in front of me! I continued to give blood and in 1985 I heard about the Anthony Nolan Trust who were appealing for people to join the Bone Marrow register. Our local doctors in Evesham were running a testing session so I went along, was tested and had yet another free cup of tea. I was found to be fit and healthy so was placed on the register. Another proud moment for me!

I continued to give blood and over the years collected a silver badge for giving 25 pints of blood and many years later a gold badge for giving 50 pints of blood. By this time the rules had changed and you could give blood every 4 months. I suddenly realised I was in with a real chance of aiming for the next

milestone – an emerald badge for giving 75 pints of blood.

This past year has been a year of milestones for me. In August I was 60 years old, had a great party and collected my buss pass. I decided to stay on at work for another year, I'm a teacher, mainly to help pay off credit cards and keep my cats in the style that they had got used to. I was still giving my pints of blood but then one day I received a letter from the Anthony Nolan Trust. At 60 years old I was officially a reject! I had been kicked off the register for being too old. They sent me a lovely certificate of thanks but I felt a little dejected. When I turned the certificate over I noticed a message that cheered me up enormously. They said I would be sorely missed but could I try to recruit a replacement? Wonderful, I thought! I can still do something useful. So, if there's any healthy person out there, between the ages of 18 and 40, perhaps you would like to join the register in my place. I handed in my resignation at school. I officially retire from teaching on July 17th and just a few weeks ago achieved my wish and gave my 75th pint of blood. I received a lovely emerald badge and was allowed 2 cups of tea. I also discovered that there is no upper age ceiling for giving blood if you are already a donor so I am now aiming to get a diamond badge when I donate my 100th pint of blood!!



TBC Recommendations For Breeders

In addition to the GCCF Code of Ethics the TBC strongly recommends that the following points are noted by owners of queens and studs.

- If breeding from a Tonkinese on the REFerence register, ensure that it complies with the current Tonkinese Registration Policy some cats are on the REFerence register because they have ancestors that are not permitted in the Tonkinese breed programme (eg. Orientals or cats of unregistered or unknown parentage).
- 2 A stud owner is not obliged to accept a queen to stud
- 3 Studs must be on the active register with the GCCF and must have their Certificate of Entirety (COE) lodged with the GCCF prior to the registration of their first litter. Stud owners should be able to show a copy of the COE to the queen's owner.
- Studs, and visiting queens, should be vaccinated against Feline Enteritis and Cat 'Flu (but not within 14 days before the mating). Homeopathic vaccinations are not acceptable. Vaccination certificates should be available for inspection.
- Studs must be regularly tested for FeLV and FIV, even if they are inoculated against FeLV. It is recommended that they are tested at least once per year and the documentation should be shown to the owners of visiting queens.
- The stud owner **must** supply the following for the queen's owner: a). A mating certificate that complies with GCCF Section 1 Rule 3d.. b) A full pedigree of the stud showing at least three generations with full registration numbers. c) A receipt for the stud fee.
- The stud owner must make clear any conditions relating to the kittens, or repeat matings, before the gueen is left with the stud.
- The stud premises should be available for inspection, by appointment, by the queen's owner prior to the queen being brought to stud.
- 9 Queens must be on the active register with the GCCF.
- 10 It is recommended that queens are tested for FeLV and FIV within 24 hours before visiting the stud, unless from a fully tested household, and the documentation should be shown to the stud's owner.
- Unaccompanied queens should not be accepted to stud (ie. sent by train, bus etc.)
- The queen's owner has a responsibility to make arrangements, including the inspection of stud premises, well in advance of taking the queen to stud.
- The queen's owner should be aware that the stud fee is for the services of the stud and is not based upon results it should be offered at the time the queen is left with the stud.
- The breeder **must supply** each kitten owner with a copy of the GCCF code of ethics; a valid vaccination certificate showing that the full course has been completed for Enteritis and cat 'flu; a properly completed pedigree certificate that includes at least three generations with full registration numbers and the pink registration certificate duly signed by the breeder for transfer of ownership
